

Don Goldsteins “Top 10”

Don has referred to several excellent reference works during his presentations that are not included in this annotated booklist. His “Top 10” reference books are:

1. Wesley Craven and James Cates 7 volume history of the USAF in WW2. This is included in the booklist (page 2, col 1, item 6)
2. Samuel Morison’s 14 volume work on the Pacific War, *History of United States Naval Operations in World War II*. This is not in the booklist. Morison’s *Two Ocean War; A Short History of the United States Navy in the Second World War*. is a good 2nd source and is in the booklist (page 10, col 1, last item)
3. Louis Morton’s *United States Army in World War II* This is a 28 volume history of the US Army in WW2. Morton is the overall editor, and author of 2 volumes in the set. Not in the booklist.
4. Hugh Thomas’s *The Spanish Civil War* This Spanish Civil War is an often neglected, but rather important, element in the buildup to WW2. Not in booklist
5. Ivone Kirpatrick’s 1964 work on Mussolini. It was published under several different titles, *Mussolini*, *Mussolini: A Study in Politics*, *Mussolini: Study of a Demagogue*, and *Mussolini: A Study in Power*. Not in booklist
6. David Brinkley’s *Washington Goes to War* In booklist (page 1, col 1)
7. Bruce Catton’s *War Lords of Washington*. In booklist (page 1, col 2)
8. John Keegan’s *Second World War* In booklist (page 3, col 2)
9. Ronald Spector’s *Eagle Against the Sun: The American War with Japan* Not in booklist
10. Stephan Ambrose’s *D Day: June 6, 1944: The Climactic Battle of World War II*. Not in booklist
